Disaster Preparedness Kit Checklist

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Notes

Include at least one gallon of water per household member per day.
Select foods that are non-perishable and require little or no preparation. Add a can opener to your kit if you include canned foods.
Include at least one flashlight for each family member.
Include extra batteries if the radio uses them.
You can purchase one of these or assemble one yourself.
Include both prescription medications and OTC pain relievers and allergy medications.
These supplies enable you to shelter in place, patch broken windows, and build impromptu shelters.
It might be nice to include rapid dissolve toilet paper, but regular will work just fine.
These are useful for first aid, hygiene, and cleanup.
Choose a sanitizer that contains at least 60% alcohol.
These are useful for their obvious purpose as well as for first aid.
These can serve as an impromptu toilet.
These aren't essential for survival, but you'll sure feel better with them!
Consider including a bottle of liquid soap. It is easier to store than a partially used bar.
These are useful for first aid and hygiene.
Include diapers and wipes. Include formula and bottles if an infant is formula fed.
You will likely have your phone with you when disaster strikes, but it is wise to keep a charger in the kit at all times so you don't have to track one down.

Auxiliary items

🗆 Cash	Include small denominations.
Basic tools	Include at least a pair of work gloves, hammer, pliers, wrench, multi-head screwdriver, and a small ax or hacksaw.
Emergency contact info and important documents	Keep these documents in a watertight container.
🗆 Maps	Include maps of your city and surrounding areas.
□ Blankets and/or a battery-powered fan	Include these as is appropriate for the local climate.
Disposable dishes	Disposable dishes eliminate the need for extra water to wash non-disposable dishes.
Entertainment items	Include small items that do not require batteries (e.g., cards, puzzle books, Crayons).
🗆 Whistle	Consider including one for each family member.

Experts recommend that you stock your emergency kit with enough supplies to care for your household for a *minimum* of three days.
