Disaster Preparedness Kit Checklist

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□ Water	Include at least one gallon of water per household member per day. Include extra water for pets.
	Select foods that are non-perishable and require little or no preparation. Add a can opener to your kit if you include canned foods.
Flashlights and batteries	Include at least one flashlight (with spare batteries) for each family member. Con- sider including a battery-powered lantern and headlamps.
Emergency radio	Choose a radio that can utilize various power sources (battery, solar, and crank).
\Box First aid kit	You can purchase one of these or assemble one yourself.
Medications	Keep a <i>minimum</i> of a seven-day supply of prescription medications on hand. If you have refrigerated medications, have a plan for how to keep them cool.
Plastic sheeting, duct tape, and masks	These supplies enable you to shelter in place, patch broken windows, and build impromptu shelters.
□ Hygiene items	Have a bucket (with or without a seat), plastic bags, and toilet paper for going potty when there is no running water. Additionally, include alcohol-based hand sanitizer, tampons/pads, wet wipes, toothbrushes/toothpaste, soap, and disposable gloves.
□ Baby items	Include diapers and wipes. Also include formula if baby drinks this.
Cell phone charger	You will likely have your phone with you when disaster strikes, but it is wise to keep a charger in the kit at all times so you don't have to track one down.
Basic tools	Include a pair of work gloves, hammer, pliers, wrench, multi-head screwdriver, and a small ax or hacksaw.
□ Cash	Local businesses may be unable to process credit or debit cards, so include some cash (try to include a variety of denominations and coins).
Emergency contact information and important documents	Store these documents in a watertight container so they are less likely to be dam- aged in flood waters or rain.
🗆 Maps	Include local and regional maps.
Blankets and/or a battery- powered fan	Select appropriate blankets and fans for your climate.
□ Whistle	Consider including a whistle for each family member.
Disposable dishes	Disposable dishes eliminate the need for extra water to wash regular ones.
Entertainment items	Include small items that don't require batteries (e.g., cards, books, crayons).

Experts recommend that you stock your emergency kit with enough supplies to care for your household for a *minimum* of three days.
